Nomination material should include a letter of recommendation with supporting documentation regarding the nominee's contributions to the field of spectroscopy, a current CV, and short bio. Submission deadline is December 1, 2014.

## 2015 Distinguished Service Award

This award recognizes the contributions of individual members for their long-time service to the Society. The Award consists of an engraved plaque and a lifetime membership in the Society. This membership shall include all the privileges and rights of a regular member. The award shall be presented at the Society for Applied Spectroscopy award ceremony held at the fall meeting. Nomination for the Distinguished Service Award may be made by Regional, Technical and or Student Sections, individual members, the Awards Committee, or the Executive Committee. Nomination material should include a letter of recommendation with supporting documentation regarding the nominee's contributions to the Society for Applied Spectroscopy and spectroscopy, a current CV, and short bio. Submission deadline is December 1, 2014.

## **Emeritus Membership Award**

This award recognizes members who have contributed to spectroscopy and have been members of the Society for Applied Spectroscopy for 15 years, and now have retired from active scientific endeavor. The Award consists of an engraved plaque and a lifetime membership in the Society. This membership shall include all the privileges and rights of a regular member. Nomination for the Emeritus Membership Award may be made by Regional, Technical and or Student Sections, individual members, the Awards Committee, or the Executive Committee. Nomination material should include a letter of recommendation with supporting documentation regarding the nominee's contributions to the Society for Applied Spectroscopy and spectroscopy, a current CV, and short bio.
